

OUR ACTIONS

The VSF International network supports families and farmers' organizations in 60 countries in Africa, the Americas, Asia and Europe. In 2024, the members of VSF International reached over 2.46 million households, with an overall budget of € 68.43 million.





LAST-MILE ANIMAL HEALTH SERVICES

Last-Mile Animal Health Services are a cornerstone of the VSF International's mission to support resilient livelihoods nd sustainable livestock systems, ensuring that remote and underserved communities have access to essential veterinary care.

 Through targeted training of community-based animal health workers (CAHWs), mobile veterinary outreach, and collaboration with local authorities, we expand service coverage across pastoralist and rural areas.

These efforts not only improve animal health, welfare and productivity but reinforce the autonomy and resilience of rural populations.



ONE HEALTH

VSF International applies the One Health approach at the community level, addressing the interconnected health of people, animals, and the ecosystems.

- In remote and pastoral areas, we deliver integrated services through mobile One Health Units, combining veterinary care, basic human health services, and environmental monitoring in a coordinated, cost-effective model.
- We strengthen early detection of zoonotic diseases by engaging community-based animal health workers, health committees, and environmental actors in local surveillance systems.
- We promote responsible use of veterinary medicines, raise awareness on antimicrobial resistance, and support access to quality drugs to curb the use of substandard products.

Collaboration is key to our approach: solutions are developed with communities, local authorities and in partnership with organizations that bring complementary technical expertise. This ensures that interventions are locally adapted, sustainable, and effective.

SUSTAINABLE LIVELIHOODS & FOOD SECURITY

VSF International supports livestock-dependent households by improving their capacity to manage animals, access services, and respond to environmental and economic risks.

 We provide trainings in animal husbandry, natural resource management, and climate-resilient practices, while improving access to markets, veterinary services, and quality inputs.

By enhancing livestock productivity and promoting diversified income sources, we empower vulnerable households to secure their nutrition, increase their resilience to shocks, and build more stable and dignified livelihoods.




AGROECOLOGY AND NATURAL RESOURCE MANAGEMENT

In areas facing environmental degradation and resource-based conflict, we promote agroecological practices that strengthen the resilience of rural communities and sustainably utilize the ecosystems they depend on.

 We support practices that regenerate soils, preserve water sources, and maintain biodiversity, while fostering inclusive governance of rangelands, pastures, and forests.

BUILDING RESILIENCE TO CLIMATE CHANGE


VSF International supports communities in adapting to increasing climate variability and environmental shocks by:

- Promoting climate-adaptive livestock systems, such as drought-tolerant breeds, fodder production or seasonal mobility.
- Supporting preparedness planning, including the development of early warning systems and communitybased risk mitigation measures.

By combining technical support with community-driven approaches, we support vulnerable populations anticipate, respond to, and recover from climate-related challenges, safeguarding their livelihoods and food security in an increasingly unpredictable climate.



OUR ACTIONS



INCLUSIVE VALUE CHAINS

VSF International supports producers (especially smallholders and marginalized groups) to access markets, improve product quality, and increase their bargaining power.

- We facilitate training in sustainable production, focusing on product quality improvement and hygiene, which is particularly important for food of animal origin.
- We enhance linkages between producers, processors, and consumers, and promote fair trade practices.

By fostering equitable participation and transparent partnerships across the value chain, VSF International ensures that benefits are fairly shared, contributing to improved incomes, food security, and community development.

YOUTH AND WOMEN EMPOWERMENT

In many rural areas, women and young people have limited access to land, credit, training, and markets, and often face restrictive social norms that constrain their full participation in livestock and agricultural value chains. VSF International works to remove these obstacles by supporting the active involvement of women and youth in livestock production, natural resource management, and decision-making processes.

 We provide training, leadership development, and access to resources, credit and markets, enabling women and young people to become key drivers of sustainable livelihoods.

Through these efforts, we foster gender equality, economic inclusion, and the creation of opportunities that build the skills and confidence needed for long-term community resilience and prosperity.





EMERGENCY RESPONSE AND RESILIENCE BUILDING

VSF International provides rapid support during emergencies, particularly in regions affected by conflict, drought, or disease outbreaks.

- We provide immediate veterinary care, restock livestock, and restore essential services to protect livelihoods during disasters.
- We strengthen long-term resilience through risk reduction strategies, capacity building, and the promotion of sustainable practices that help communities better prepare for, respond, and recover from future shocks.



ADVOCACY AND AWARENESS RAISING

VSF International actively engages in advocacy and awareness raising to influence policies and practices that support sustainable livestock development and rural livelihoods.

- Through targeted campaigns and strategic partnerships, we raise awareness on critical issues such as animal health, pastoralist's rights, food security, gender equality, and climate resilience, driving positive change for vulnerable populations.
- We support capacity building for civil society and producer organizations so they can effectively participate in decisionmaking processes.



COMPETENCY AND CURRICULUM GUIDELINES FOR COMMUNITY ANIMAL HEALTH WORKERS (CAHWS)

The WOAH Competency and Curriculum **Guidelines for Community Animal Health** Workers (CAHWs) set out the essential knowledge and competencies that CAHWs should acquire. The aim is to ensure that training programmes offer a common set of core competencies that are recognised by public and private animal health services, thereby building trust within communities and delivering high-quality services. The guidelines also provide a framework for harmonised training, enabling regulatory bodies to set qualifications for CAHW registration. This helps to better recognize and monitor the contributions of CAHWs to the veterinary workforce and national animal health services.

HANDBOOK FOR PLANNING AND MANAGING CAHW

VSF International's Handbook for planning and managing CAHW is a practical guide designed to support private, public and civil society organisations, along with their financial partners, in implementing sustainable community-based animal health services. Complementing the WOAH guidelines, it focuses on sustainability factors for successful programmes and improves future approaches to CAHW training and deployment.

Additionally, the Handbook offers practical recommendations for Veterinary statutory bodies, veterinary services, and line ministries in countries considering formally recognising CAHWs as official members of their animal health workforce.

To promote the uptake of the recommendations and guidelines, the project had planned to organise regional workshops in West Africa, East Africa, and Southeast Asia. Unfortunately, the USAID funding cuts that hit the humanitarian and development community worldwide in January 2025 also affected the CAHW project, which was entirely financed by USAID's Bureau of Humanitarian Assistance. The project was halted just before the regional workshops could be organised and efforts to disseminate the two key documents could gain momentum.

Despite the funding challenges, we will continue to seek innovative solutions and new partnerships to continue our commitment to high-quality community-based animal health services. Our focus remains on ensuring that the recommendations and guidelines are accessible and widely disseminated to all stakeholders to ensure a sustainable future for CAHWs and the communities they serve.

FINANCE

Overall, in 2024 the VSF International network had a total income of € 68.43 million.

With varying budgets and structures, the members of the VSF International network implement development, humanitarian and transitional projects in the field, organise education and awareness raising activities in their countries and support the common activities of the network.

In 2024, the total income of the VSF International coordination office was € 280,895.

GOVERNANCE

VSF International is a non-profit organisation (a.i.s.b.l. in French) registered in Belgium. It is governed by a General Assembly composed of all the members of the network, with senior management providing representation. The General Assembly meets annually to define the organisation's global vision and strategy, approve the financial statements and budgets, and elect the Board every two years. The Board implements the decisions of the General Assembly while supporting the coordination office's day-to-day activities in Brussels. Board members also participate in various working groups focusing on specific themes, alongside other technical experts from the national VSFs

VSF International is managed by a coordination office in Brussels (Belgium), which is responsible for fostering collaboration between members, coordinating joint projects and campaigns, leading external communication and representing the network at the international level.
